

Cookie Statement

A cookie is a small text file that is stored in your browser when you visit a website that uses cookies. In this way, information is stored that can be sent back to the servers of a website on a subsequent visit. The purposes of cookies range from tracking your movements within a site to remembering login details and preferences. Metis uses buttons and cookies to improve the functionality of the website. A more detailed explanation of the why we use each one of them will be given in the following section.

Overview cookies

1. Functional cookies

A functional cookie has the purpose of creating an optimal functioning website. In our case, Congressus uses cookies to save browsing information in order to improve the functionality of the website for future visits of the website. These are cookies that ensure that preferences are saved and login details are stored.

2. Session tracking

Metis uses a New Relic cookie which monitors what parts of the website you have visited. With this type of information, we can tailor the website services to the browsing behaviour of visitors and spot possible flaws of the website. This type of cookie is automatically deleted after closing the web browser.

3. Google Analytics

The Google Analytics cookie measures the visitors' activity on the website. Google can share this information with third parties only if (i) Google is legally obliged to do so or (ii) when third parties process the data on behalf of Google. Because Google is a third party in this use of cookies, Metis has no influence on this. You can find more information on Google's use of cookies and privacy measures at
